## ART VISIT TO WODONGA WITH MS HANOVER

On Friday 23rd October a group of students from Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 visited several exhibitions at Arts Space Wodonga and at the newly refurbished MAMA at Albury. It was really interesting and informative to see Shaun Tan's artistic process, from initial sketches to completed book, to completed animation of *The Lost Thing*. Students participated in some drawing activities. The highlight was drawing on bottle tops that will be exhibited at Arts Space at the end of Shaun Tan's *The Lost Thing* exhibition. Outside Arts Space, some of the students added to a public arts project by completing the sentence "In my lifetime I will....."

At MAMA, students saw several video works by a young local artist, Andrew Pearce; along with photographic works by the iconic Australian photographer Max Dupain, the controversial photographer Bill Henson and the internationally famous indigenous artist Tracey Moffatt. The wall sculptures by indigenous artist Lorraine Connelly-Northey used many of the materials that were part of the original Albury Gallery, giving students insights into how western style materials can be used to create subversive new works.



Outside the gallery, on the lawn, there are several large scale public art works, including the giant pink snail.

Some great questions were posed by students during the day:

"Why is this art?"

"Why would you pose naked for a photo that is publicly displayed?"

"Why does the work cost that much when the materials are just a bunch of ordinary kitchen sponges?"



PLEASE NOTE: Gattaca DVD has returned to the booklist from previous years. If you have a copy of this DVD, you can bring that into the sale also.


# YEAR 9 MATHS-GRAPHING



## Health Corner ...with Adolescent Health Nurse Rosemary Bunge

Myrtleford P12 is a SunSmart School and this means hats must be worn when outside during Terms 1 and 4. This is a very important part of SunSmart and reducing the risk of sun damage and future risk of skin cancers. ***Slip on a Shirt, Slop on Sunscreen, Slap on a Hat, Seek Shade and Slide on Sunglasses*** is still the message from the cancer council and worth remembering both at school and away from school.

### Skin cancer facts & stats

- 2 in 3 Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer by the age of 70.
  - Around 2,000 Australians die from skin cancer each year.
  - Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world.
  - Skin cancers account for about 80% of all new cancers diagnosed each year in Australia. Each year, Australians are 4 times more likely to develop a common skin cancer than any other form of cancer.
  - Over 750,000 Australians are treated for skin cancer each year— that's over 2,000 people every day.
  - Skin cancer already cost the health system around \$300 million annually over a decade ago, the highest cost of all cancers. More recently it has been calculated that the total cost of skin cancers (other than melanoma) alone was \$512.3 million in 2010 (diagnosis, treatment and pathology).
  - The most commonly diagnosed cancer among adolescents and young adults is melanoma; it accounts for more than one-quarter of all cancers among Australians aged 15–29 years.
  - In 2013, 374 Victorians died from melanoma.
  - Eighty-nine per cent of Victorians are alive five years following a diagnosis of melanoma. This has improved significantly from 85% in 1985.
  - It is estimated that approximately 200 melanomas and 34,000 other skin cancer types per year are caused by occupational exposures in Australia.
  - In Victoria, melanoma is the fifth most common cancer overall. 2,307 Victorians were diagnosed with melanoma in 2013 (that is equivalent to six diagnoses every day).
  - Melanoma is the fourth most common cancer for Victorian women (behind breast, bowel and lung)
  - Melanoma is the fourth most common cancer in Victorian men (behind prostate, bowel and lung).
- Research shows that using solariums before the age of 35 boosts the risk of melanoma by 59%.

There has been an infestation of paper red back spiders and ghostly hands in the library over the past week.


During lunchtime, students have been participating in craft activities, and their great work can be seen hanging off the library roof. There are plenty of spooky books to share in the library, or take home to read.
