
We look forward to your continued support in improving student learning through consistent school attendance.

**BADMINTON GIRLS**



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### SRC members attended the VicSRC Congress in Melbourne over the holidays

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### VicSRC Congress

For three days at Ormond College in Melbourne, during the recent term break, Briana Hines (Yr 8), Georgia Milford (Yr 10), Amy Rogers (Yr 8), Brooke Sinnett (Yr 11), Emma Shaw (Yr 8) and Corey Taylor (Yr 8) were among 180 students from over 60 schools developing student-led solutions to educational issues and having fun.

All delegates and visiting students voted on proposals using a new electronic voting system, with the top five proposals forming the VicSRC advocacy agenda for 2016-2017. Delegates took up the challenge to work together, creating compelling solutions to the issues shared across schools.

During the camp, the Myrtleford P12 students felt very accepted and welcomed into Ormond College atmosphere, despite coming from a small rural school. Students learnt about leadership councils and the operation of SRCs of many different schools and how various schools worked differently from 'little old' Myrtleford P12 College. Many of the girls came back with innovative ideas for the student council, along with a new outlook on student voice and recognising that anyone can make a difference in the school setting.

They are all highly excited for next year, anticipating an even bigger, more vibrant and more diverse community at the VicSRC Congress 2017.

### Rural Youth Ambassador Program

At the same time as VicSRC Congress was taking place, Tom Scott (Yr 11) and the other 19 Rural Youth Ambassadors from across Victoria met in Melbourne for their initial workshops.

Day 1- The Rural Youth Ambassadors (RYAs) met at Southern Cross on Wednesday and then trammed their way across Melbourne to the Bastow Leadership Institute where they introduced themselves and were asked to explain what they thought they were getting involved in. The past achievements and activities of the RYAs were raised and from this the current RYAs started to discuss what they thought were the issues affecting their rural areas/regions.

For dinner on the first night they divided into groups and each group cooked/prepared part of a meal to share with the entire group.

Day 2 started off in the State Library, meeting with the ABC coordinator of Heywire (the national rural and remote youth organisation). From here they finalised their choice of issues/topics.

In the afternoon they met with the Rural Youth Ambassadors alumni (previous participants in the RYA program) and they shared stories of what they had been involved in.

On Day 3 the RYAs went to the VicSRC Congress and participated in the presentation of various youth issues with the Congress delegates. It was interesting and reaffirming that the issues being discussed by the Congress delegates were very similar to those being thrashed out by the RYAs.

The next big event for the RYAs is another 3 day residential event during the Term 3 break, but before then RYAs will be seeking sponsorship from their local communities.

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## Aboriginal Summer School for Excellent in Technology and Science (ASSETS)

Run by CSIRO, ASSETS is a nine-day residential program for high-achieving Indigenous Year 10 students, with an ongoing leadership and support program to nurture students through Years 11 and 12.

**ASSETS summer schools will be running in Adelaide, Newcastle and Townsville in December 2016 and January 2017. There is NO COST for attending students with return airfares, accommodation and meals all provided.**

Eligible students are those who:

- are completing Year 10 studies in 2016
- have an interest and demonstrated ability in science and mathematics
- identify with their Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and heritage
- are prepared to challenge themselves academically and personally in a supportive environment.

Nominations are now open in the following categories:




