### 2016 NAPLAN Results

As you would be aware students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 completed NAPLAN testing in numeracy and literacy during Term 2. The purpose of the testing is to identify strengths and areas for improvement on an individual student level and collectively as a College. We received the results recently and initial analysis once again indicates some excellent results. Strategies targeted at improving literacy are having an impact with reading and spelling improving overall across the College. Whilst this is pleasing we will continue to review our teaching and learning to achieve continued improvement.

Parents of students in these year levels will receive their child's results in the mail. Parents are reminded that NAPLAN results are just one indicator of student performance and that a more comprehensive understanding of academic progress can be obtained by speaking to your child's teacher. ## ICT Skills in 4HS



Remember, if you come across a baby wombat without its mother, or you hit a wombat that has a baby in its pouch, there are some important steps to help its survival.

1. If the Wombat is on the road, ask an adult to safely drag the wombat to the side.
2. Check for a baby in the pouch.
3. Wrap the baby in a pillow case or blanket and keep it dark. Wombats also like it quiet!
4. Ring the local wildlife rescue person or take to the vet as soon as possible.

## YEAR 8 - JAPANESE STUDIES




In Term 3, Year 8 has been studying medieval and modern-day Japan. They have completed fact sheets that outline the key aspects of Japan; the capital city, which continent it is in, currency and many other facts. They have also completed an amazing timeline of the natural disasters that have occurred from 1920 to 2016.

On Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> August, as a reward for all their hard work, the Year 8s made sushi. Sushi is a traditional Japanese dish that consists of rice, seaweed wraps and a variety of fillings. All students made their own sushi by using the bamboo rolling mats. They enjoyed fillings like smoked salmon, flavoured chicken, tuna, carrot, lettuce and a few others. Some students experimented with the different sauces on offer, including Wasabi and Sriracha, which resulted in some flavoursome sushi rolls and some quick trips to the drink taps.

Students are now researching one aspect of medieval Japan to present to students and the greater school community on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> September in the 5-8 building. ## WORK BENCH


VCAL students Connor and Tim are making a work bench with shelving. The students designed the table per specifications given to them.

## OUTDOOR EDUCATION CAMP TO BOGONG HIGH PLAINS



Ten students participated in the final camp for Unit 3/4 Outdoor Ed, comparing the Bogong High Plains from Summer to Winter. Students were able to compare commercialisation of the outdoors with thousands of people flocking to Falls Creek in pursuit of snow. Students were able to draw upon this experience to determine the impacts on the environment

and establish sustainable management methods that could be used to ensure the environment is looked after for future generations and no loss of biodiversity.

### Day 1

We caught a bus from Mt Beauty to Falls Creek and checked into Myrtleford Alpine Lodge to drop off gear and food. We then made our way to Windy Corner to hire our equipment. Once we were fitted and ready we made our way to the 'Nordic Bowl' where the students spent some time practicing their skills and control on cross country skis. For all the students this was their first time on cross country skis.

Once everyone was relatively confident on skis we undertook a small ski tour around Sun Valley, about a 4 km ski tour along the Rocky Valley Lake and outskirts of the resort. This took most of the afternoon.



We then returned to our accommodation and enjoyed a relaxing night in the lodge. The weather was very good with blue skies.

### Day 2

The weather was bad, white out and rain. We waited for an extra hour for the weather to clear and decided that we will get out there and give it a go. We undertook a small ski tour and made a snow cave and igloo. Students were able to hone their ski skills once again and have a good play in the snow. We decided to leave the mountain early due to bad weather. Overall a good trip and the students enjoyed the experience.

We took our first load in 2014 and have now taken bags to around 180 girls. What am I talking about?

During our time in the Lacluta classrooms we had noticed that there were always some girls missing. Why? It finally dawned on us that these girls had their "periods".

On doing some investigation it appeared that when this happened there was nothing to do except stay inside your house.

In 2014 women in NE Vic started to sew and pack bags. We carried over about 30 bags. At first the girls were very embarrassed and diffident about meeting with us but, after shutting out some inquisitive boys, they accepted our explanation and their bags gratefully.

In 2015 the girls were waiting for us. This year we distributed about 100 bags. The number of girls attending school is growing hugely. In fact where there

was 1 Middle School 3 years ago this year we found 4 of them. There are many more girls and boys going to school. This is a wonderful development.

**However it means that 150 bags will be needed for our 2017 trips.**

Can we set up a **More Days for Girls Sewing Group** in Myrtleford?

Could you come along with or without your sewing machine and/or overlocker once a month and help us produce these items? We would need cutters as well as sewers. A lot of the sewing is straight forward though some, more challenging.
