Our students have performed very well in these tests over the past few years and we look forward to receiving the results, which will be used to inform future teaching and learning. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early – a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the later years, and receive lower test scores than their classmates. It's vital that students go to school every day – even in the early years of primary school.

We are very lucky at MP12 College to have been approached by Albury Wodonga Regional Food Share offering a program connecting schools with local farmers and providing food supplies free of charge to help with things like our breakfast program. Mr Pear and I have met with Victor Citroen who is the schools program coordinator.

Last Wednesday I had the opportunity to tour the facility in Wodonga. The main aim of this program is to work in partnership with The National Farmers Federation to make fresh, healthy and locally-produced foods available to all children.

The main objectives of the healthy food program are helping children to eat a healthy meal at least once a day and understanding how their food is produced through connecting them with farmers.

Students will learn how food is produced, where it is processed and how to interpret food labelling.

This is a wonderful opportunity for our school and in the first instance will add to the existing breakfast program so kindly supported by our local Coles supermarket and our local bakeries Heiner's and Myrtleford Bakehouse. Food from food share will enable us to extend our food choices at breakfast and sometime in the future we may be able to offer other special meal sharing opportunities.
