She will participate in CEDA (culture, environment, development & adventure) Nepal 2018, with other students from schools around our region, through Outdoor Education School 15 Mile Creek. This is an extension camp that she applied for after completing The Future Makers camp last year in Year 9.

It is an amazing opportunity for her to experience another culture and learn about their environmental issues, while seeing some of the most spectacular locations in the world. 
Our carers tell us that the good times far outweigh the tough, and their lives are enriched as they help a child move toward reaching their potential.


