Our final School Banking day for 2018 is TUESDAY 11 DECEMBER.




Year 8 State Volleyball Finals

After school, on Thursday the 15th of November, both myself and Kath Morgan drove a group of extremely talented young men down to Melbourne for the State Volleyball Finals.

After staying the night in Melbourne, everybody awoke early with a degree of excitement and eagerness for the day to come. We got ready and we made our way to the Dandenong Stadium by 9 am for warm ups, with the other remaining schools turning up soon after. Our team had a bye for the first game so there was an opportunity to size up the competition. The boys realised from the start that points were not going to be easy to come by, and they were going to have to fight tooth and nail to compete at this top level.

The first match the boys played, everything seemed to click into place. Our team was playing in unison and communication between the players was great. Kaiden, Tom, Addison and Damon were setting up the ball with some excellent digs and sets and this was capitalised upon by Liam Macgowan, Liam Morgan and Levi, drilling the ball back into the opposing court with power and accuracy. The boys narrowly lost the first set, but went on to win the second and third sets to claim the match. This was the first time a representative team from our College had won a match of volleyball at state level. Everyone was jubilant after the win.

The second match was against the team that ended up the overall winners of our pool. They were exceptionally well drilled in positional play and individual/team skills and tactics. Led by Liam Macgowan, the nominated team captain, we started off slowly but then won some consecutive points, bolstering our confidence levels and fueling some very competitive rallies. Levi Young and Liam Morgan played pivotal roles at the net and their awareness and skills grew as the game went on. Slowly but surely the initial nerves dissipated and we settled into some good game play. Our team went down by only a few points in each of the two sets played. A fabulous effort. The boys identified that improving the consistency of our serves going in may have resulted in an even closer outcome for this match.

In the third match we played Eltham, whom I have subsequently been informed, have an elaborate and dedicated volleyball program at their college. We were caught unawares by the tenacity and perfect execution of serves and strategic play by this college. Eltham ended up winning the match in two sets but at no point did our boys give up, fighting through to the end.

Overall, it was a fantastic experience for our Year 8 Volleyball Team. They are of a rare ilk that has seen members of this group involved in a staggering four State Finals during this year, for a variety of sports. For the boys to qualify to this level and play up against schools that have dedicated sporting programs was a fabulous effort, and they should be proud of their efforts. This week the Myrtleford P-12 represented the Hume region at the state championships in Melbourne for both Basketball and Baseball year 8 division.

Day 1: State Basketball-Melbourne Sports and Aquatics Centre

The first championship was the Basketball held on the 19th at Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre. The first team we were up against was St Joseph's Echuca. This proved to be a very tight and highly competitive game for both halves, right to the end. In the dying seconds of the game we were three points down so we called a tactical time out. The plan was to have the ball down our end of the court and devise and set play to get us a three pointer shot. With about 10 seconds on the match clock, the target was Liam Macgowan, but the set play did not go 100% to plan and ended up with Levi Young. Not phased, he shot a long range three pointer that hit the target on the buzzer to level the game. The final result, a draw against a very strong team.

Game 3 was our final game against WMR, again, a very strong team. We were able to match them shot for shot in the first half, however they snuck away on the scoreboard in the second half to win by 6 points. Tom Crisp was able to shoot a long range three pointer on the buzzer to finish on a little high.

In the last innings we tried two new pitchers in Tom Crisp and Kaidan McPherson and both boys did a great job in such a critical position on the field. In the end we finished with a good win even with one less batting innings.

Game three, against the 2018 Year 7 State premiers Strathmore College, was always going to be very difficult to win. The game started off very well for the Myrtleford boys, with a two run lead after two innings, however it didn't take long for Strathmore College to get some players on base and hit several home runs to really blow out the margin. The game concluded with a dominating performance from the opposition, who finished overall second in the competition.

Big performances came from Liam Macgowan and Liam Morgan as our main two pitchers for the three games, and Zach Allan as our only catcher for the three games, who did a great job for his first time. The Myrtleford team finished the day with two wins and one loss which is a fantastic result. Out of the three sports that MyrtlefordP-12 represented in the last week at State, this was our best result.

Talking art with Mrs Craftwright



GIRLS IN CYBER SECURITY ADVANCING

Charles Sturt University is running a project called 'Girls in Cyber Security Advancing (GiCSA)'. The project is aimed at giving girls in Year 9 and 10 a chance to learn about cyber security and potential career paths in information technology in a tertiary setting.

These workshops will be open to any girl in Year 9 or 10, though will be suited more for those who already have an interest in information technology, or are open to different career options.

Girls who attend these workshops will experience a range of activities including presentations, discussions and hands-on tasks. Taking part in these activities will also help prepare the girls for our Cyber Security Challenge in October 2019. What is GiCSA?
Girls in Cyber Security Advancing (GiCSA) is a project aimed at getting year 9 and 10 girls interested in and involved with cyber security. Cyber security is a field suffering from a shortage of women, and GiCSA is working towards changing that. Only 1% of all information security jobs are held by women, and more than half of those are admin or non-managerial positions.

We can change this!

What is involved?
The GiCSA program will run in six NSW regional towns where CSU campuses are located - Albury-Wodonga, Bathurst, Dubbo, Orange, Port Macquarie and Wagga Wagga. The project will involve:

- Cyber security awareness and training workshops over three days at your closest CSU campus.
- Participation in an online cyber security challenge to work in teams of 4. Training and mentoring will be provided.
- Four best performing teams will be invited to participate in a Leadership and Entrepreneurship workshop to be held in Wagga Wagga for three days. Travel cost to attend the workshop will be paid for.
- The Leadership workshop will provide an opportunity to learn what it's like to develop a cyber security start-up and interact with some very successful women in cyber security.
- The best performing team will also be awarded complimentary attendance to the Australian Information Security Association (AISA) National conference 2020 to be held in one of the major cities, likely to be in Sydney or Melbourne.
- All participants will receive a certificate of participation in the GiCSA project.


