

Hey everybody, it has been quite a while since I did another one of these articles, but I wanted to talk about the importance of self-motivation and how beneficial it can be. When we do things, normally we have reasons for doing them, which is our motivation to get them done for those reasons.

Sometimes we need to force ourselves to get things done, but if we allow ourselves to set our own goals for the future, then we give ourselves more reasons to complete these tasks. Say for instance you had this brilliant idea for a website, but you needed to learn how to code before you could build this fantastic website. Just the thought of making that website will give you the motivation to learn how to code.

Motivation can play a key part in getting your schoolwork finished. Benalla P12 Sporting Clays Championships



HEALTH CORNER...with Adolescent Health Nurse Rosemary Bunge

Grade 6 puberty classes in Term 4

Sexuality education is important and should start when children are young. Talk about feelings, relationships and values. Primary and secondary school children need age-appropriate information about sex and reproduction. At Myrtleford P-12 we will be using a resource developed by the DET as part of standard curriculum. Puberty brings about dramatic physical and emotional changes that may be frightening to an unprepared child. To help prepare students, I have been supporting teachers in Year 6 over the last few weeks with puberty classes. If you have students in that age group, now is a good time to be talking to them about growing up.

Topics we are covering include changes of puberty, relationships, responsibilities, where to go for help, reproduction, social skills and getting along and the art of conversation. Information will be shared in many ways; games, books, quizzes, charts and simple chats.

I have also been involved with sex education classes for Year 8 and soon the MYCAL group, so if your students are in that year level it is also a good idea to be talking to them now.

Topics we are covering include reproduction, sexual health – contraception and STIs.

Ask your child what they learnt today?

Young people want to talk with their parents and carers about sexual health. Avoiding the subject won't stop young people learning about sex, but it may result in them relying on inaccurate information.

Talking to young people about sex does not encourage sexual experimentation. In fact, research indicates that young people who receive a comprehensive sexuality (sex) education have a lower risk of unintended pregnancy and are less likely to have sex at an early age.

The easiest way to talk to your child about sexuality is to start at an early age, though it's never too late. Answer questions honestly and directly when they come up and find out together what you don't know as you go along.

Year 7 Maths

The start of Term 4 has been a busy and fun one in Year 7 Maths as we have begun using Maths Pathway in our classes. Our students have been challenged through a number of “rich tasks” such as exploring Mobius strips, Emoji graphs and developing spatial patterns. These tasks are designed to be challenging, collaborative and open ended. Usually the question asked can be solved in many different ways. It has been so interesting to see students approach these tasks with different strategies and persevering even when the question seems difficult to answer. We have also had the opportunity to play lots of great Maths games to build confidence, reasoning and fluency with a variety of different Maths skills. These have been very well received by our students with a number of students showing their competitive side!

Our students have also undergone their first round of diagnostic testing and are now working away on their first learning cycle. Maths Pathway has the ability to accurately diagnose prior knowledge and then build an individual learning pathway for each student at their point of need. During each lesson, students will be working on different areas of Maths depending on their needs. We as teachers, will be running small group lessons at the same time using hands on learning strategies to help students build confidence and understanding. At the end of each learning cycle, students will be tested on their individual growth and mastery of the topics they have studied.

As teachers, we have had so much fun working with our classes through these tasks and have been impressed with everyone’s willingness to try a new approach to learning Maths. We are very excited to continue developing this program in Term 4 and into 2020.
