2020 School Council Elections - Information for Parents

What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally formed bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within centrally provided guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

Who is on the school council?

There are three possible categories of membership:

- **A Mandated Elected Parent Category.** More than one third of the total members must be from this category. Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (DEECD) employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not employed at the school.
- **A Mandated Elected DEECD Employee Category.** Members of this category may make up no more than one third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- **An Optional Community Member Category.** Its members are appointed by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. DEECD employees are not eligible to be Community members.

The term of office for all members is two years. Half the members must retire each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

Why is Parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying in itself and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

How can you become involved?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant. In view of this, you might seriously consider standing for election as a member of the school council or encouraging another person to stand for election.

Do I need special experience to be on school council?

No. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

What do you need to do to stand for election?

The Principal will issue a notice and call for nominations following the commencement of Term 1 each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March.

If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent Category.

DEECD employees whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not employed are eligible to nominate as parents for the school council where their child is enrolled.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the Principal within the time stated on the notice of election. If there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

Remember

- Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do
- Consider standing for election to council this year
- Be sure to vote in the elections.
- Contact the Principal for further information.



Talking about Maths... with Ms Macrae

How can parents help with Maths learning in secondary school?

Professor Jo Boaler of Stanford University is an expert on Mathematics learning and mindsets that lead to success in Maths. The following tips are an extract from her advice to parents at www.youcubed.org

1	Always be encouraging and never tell kids they are wrong when they are working on maths problems. Instead find the logic in their thinking – there is always some logic to what they say. For example if your child multiplies 3 by 4 and gets 7, say – Oh I see what you are thinking, you are using what you know about addition to add 3 and 4, when we multiply we have 4 groups of 3...
2	Never associate maths with speed. It is not important to work quickly, and we now know that forcing kids to work quickly on maths is the best way to start maths anxiety for children, especially girls.
3	Never share with your children the idea that you were bad at maths at school or you dislike it – especially if you are a mother. Researchers found that as soon as mothers shared that idea with their daughters, their daughter’s achievement went down.
4	Encourage number sense. What separates high and low achievers is number sense – having an idea of the size of numbers and being able to separate and combine numbers flexibly. For example, when working out $29 + 56$, if you take one from the 56 and add one to 29, this makes it $30 + 55$, it is much easier to work out. The flexibility to work with numbers in this way is what is called number sense and it is very important.
5	Perhaps most important of all – encourage a “growth mindset” let students know that they have unlimited maths potential and that being good at maths is all about working hard. When children have a growth mindset, they do well with challenges and do better in school overall. When children have a fixed mindset and they encounter difficult work, they often conclude that they are not “a math person”. Use growth praise such as “it is great that you have learned that”, “I really like your thinking about that”. When they tell you something is hard for them, or they have made a mistake, tell them: “That’s wonderful, your brain is growing!”

St Mary's Parish and School are conducting the preparation program for the Sacrament of **Reconciliation** in Term 2. This program is for baptised children of Catholic families, beginning at Year 3 level. Children in higher grade levels who have not previously received this Sacrament are also welcome. The Sacraments of Confirmation & Eucharist will follow in July and September.

The Diocese of Sandhurst publication '*Steps in Faith: A Parish Approach to Sacramental Preparation*' is the course that is followed. The preparation program consists primarily of four group sessions following the '*Steps in Faith*' booklet. By committing to this preparation program, parents undertake to work through the *Steps in Faith* program in groups with their children to adequately prepare them for the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

There will be an information evening for Reconciliation on Tuesday 14th of April at 6pm in the MLC building at St Mary's Primary School. It is important that you and your child come to this meeting. Fr Pompeyo will give an overview of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The children will participate in an activity with the teachers. Cluster groups in preparation for the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be organised at the meeting on the 14th of April.
