

Easton had the opportunity to talk to his classmates about his achievements. This turned into a "media frenzy" of questions. There was even time for an autograph session!




LIBRARY NEWS

Year 8 Science

Students have been exploring Biological Sciences including cells and systems. They made microscope slides of both animal and plant cells. Students also created amazing models of specialised cells and identified how they are adapted to their role.



This week they have been able to dissect a heart and lungs. Students were able to see how a network of hollow tubes connect and identify the pathway of air, as well as the passage of blood through the heart. They could see how much a lung can expand and return to its initial state, along with the differences between the sides of the heart. We were able to complete this activity with the support of Clyde Street Butchery who supplied us with the heart and lungs free of charge. This kind of opportunity is a memorable one for most students, it really helps them connect theory to reality.






Year 9/10 STEM

This term has been a very busy one for students in the Year 9/10 STEM elective. We have learn about electrical circuits, have become experts in the “makey makey” circuit board and have coded our own games using Scratch. The “makey makey” is a special tool that provides an interface between our computer and people. Using objects that are able to conduct electricity, we are able to control our computer keyboard.

Our STEM students utilised all of these skills to design and build a game controller. This game controller needed to be one that someone with a physical disability, such as arthritis, multiple sclerosis or amputation, could use to play their computer game. They researched their condition

to fully understand how mobility might be impacted before designing their prototype. We used the engineering design cycle to continue to build and improve our designs with one criteria being particularly important – that the controller be robust enough for other people to use it.





Year 9/10 STEM

Demonstrating our creations to Year 5 and 6 students!



I am so proud of the creations our students came up with, the class showed much creativity, inclusiveness and persistence. Working with electrical circuits can be frustrating however, everyone continued to improve their design until their game controller functioned perfectly.

We invited our Year 8 students and the Grade 5/6's to try out our games and controllers, all of which proved their robustness by still being fully functional after five classes of visitors! We also showed how this technology could be used to create a "human piano" – always the most entertaining part of the experience.

This term five lucky and enthusiastic Year 11 students have started the Swinburne Space Challenge. The team formed at the end of 2021 with the hope of being selected to take part in this challenge. We were very lucky to receive a STEM grant for \$2500 from the Australian Government to fully cover the cost of our participation in this program. We received news earlier in the year that our applications had been successful and the first 6-week unit began during Term 2.



The first unit has involved meeting weekly to learn about an aspect of space, including solar system exploration, satellites, space law and some of the great technology that has made it's way into our world. The team completed a "mini-challenge" each week and met with their university mentors via zoom to further discuss the topic each week.

After the Term 2 holidays, the most exciting phase of the project starts. Our team will be designing an experiment that could be performed in a micro-gravity environment, on the international space station (ISS). They will work with their university mentors to make their experiment as exciting and successful as possible, before pitching their idea to a panel. In previous years, one experiment was chosen to be carried out on the ISS. This year, we have been informed that ALL projects will be able to be performed in space, which is VERY exciting! We look very forward to sharing Myrtleford P12's contribution to space research later in the year.

Crime Analysis Year 10 Science

Our Year 10 students have taken a short break from their study of Genetics to solve a crime at Myrtleford P12 College! To help them solve the crime, students used a variety of different forensic techniques to gradually eliminate suspects until they identified the perpetrator. They used fingerprint analysis, chromatography, blood typing and finally DNA analysis to confirm that Ms. Schaefer was responsible for the crime.

These pictures show the students of 10B performing a chromatography test on the ink left at the crime scene and learning how to use micropipettes to perform a DNA analysis, using Gel Electrophoresis.



Civics and Citizenship Grade 3 and 4

This term in Civics and Citizenship classes, Years 3 and 4 have been studying the role of local government and the services it provides to the community. Students examined how rules and laws affect them and the importance of laws in society. They also explored cultural diversity in their community and how belonging to different groups can shape personal identity.

As part of this learning there was an excursion to the Alpine Shire Offices on Friday 17th June, hosted by Mayor Sarah Nicholas, Councillor Simon Kelley, Events Team member Elaine Burridge and Acting CEO Alan Clark. The students engaged in a 'mock' council meeting. Seven pre-selected students became 'Councillors' for the meeting.



The remaining students were divided into three groups and given a brief: to come up with the features that they would like to see in the Myrtleford Splash Park. Unfortunately, due to limited funds the 'Councillors' could only accept two submissions. Students then used their persuasive skills to try to convince the 'Councillors' that they should vote in agreement for their particular submission.



Students thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to present their ideas and gained firsthand experience into the inner workings of the Alpine Shire Council.
