



2024 School Council Elections - Information for Parents

What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally formed bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within centrally provided guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students. *Who is on the school council?*

There are three possible categories of membership:

• A Mandated Elected Parent Category. More than one third of the total members must be from this category. Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (DEECD) employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not employed at the school.

• A Mandated Elected DEECD Employee Category. Members of this category may make up no more than one third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.

• An Optional Community Member Category. Its members are appointed by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. DEECD employees are not eligible to be Community members.

The term of office for all members is two years. Half the members must retire each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

Why is Parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying in itself and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

How can you become involved?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant. In view of this, you might seriously consider standing for election as a member of the school council or encouraging another person to stand for election.

Do I need special experience to be on school council?

No. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

What do you need to do to stand for election?

The Principal will issue a notice and call for nominations following the commencement of Term 1 each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March.

If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent Category.

DEECD employees whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not employed are eligible to nominate as parents for the school council where their child is enrolled.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the Principal within the time stated on the notice of election. If there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

Remember

- Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do
- Consider standing for election to council this year
- Be sure to vote in the elections.
- Contact the Principal for further information.



7B Arithmetic Games Challenge

On 29th February, Year 7B participated in the Arithmetic Game Challenge. The class was divided into teams of three students. Each team was given a set of 10 cards. Each card had 4 numbers.





Each team had to try and make the number 60 using each of the four numbers on the card **exactly** once.

Students could use any operation of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. The use of brackets and the rules of BODMAS was encouraged to make each equation correct. Teams were asked to record their equations on the board. One point was awarded to each correct equation. Each team was totally engaged in this activity and students worked positively together.


Science Term 1 update
















Year 9/10- Building Boats

9/10 STEM Elective – Building boats Year 9 and 10 students have learnt about the Engineering Design Cycle at the beginning of this term. They applied the cycle to research, design and construct boat prototypes. They also had the opportunity to reflect on the features of their boats and build a modified design to improve the performance of the boat. It was brilliant to see students begin to incorporate motors and circuitry, different buoyancy features and creativity into their designs.





As part of the Year 1 and 2 Science unit 'Earth's Resources', students participated in making icecream to spark their curiosity about where things come from. Students were hands-on, mixing ingredients to make their own ice cream and learning about where those ingredients come from.

We discovered that milk and cream come from cows and that farmers milk them to get the milk. Sugar, which adds sweetness to the ice cream, comes from sugar cane which are grown on farms. Salt, which helps lower the freezing point of the ice cream mixture to -4 degrees, comes from salt mines or from evaporating seawater.

Father-child playtime is an important aspect of a child's development. Playtime not only allows for bonding and building a stronger relationship between a father and child, but it also has significant positive effects on a child's development. In this short blog, we will explore the benefits of fathers

and father figures simply playing with their children, and how it positively impacts their development.


- Builds Social Skills Fathers playing with their children allows children to develop social skills, such as cooperation, sharing, and taking turns. These skills are important for future social interactions, such as making friends, school, and work environments. Father-child playtime can also help children develop emotional intelligence by learning how to identify and manage emotions through role-playing and other types of play.
- 2. Encourages Physical Development Fathers playing with their children can also have a significant impact on a child's physical development. Activities such as throwing and catching a ball, riding a bike, or simply running around can help develop gross motor skills, coordination, and balance. These skills are essential for a child's overall development, and the opportunities to engage in physical activity with their fathers are important.

These memories can also help foster a strong relationship between fathers and children, which can provide a foundation for a lifetime of love and support.

I look forward to sharing more on what our two library leaders get up to.







